

Worker's Project Information Sheet

The Thames Tunnel is the world's oldest underwater tunnel. Once called 'the eighth wonder of the world', its construction revolutionised engineering and its legacies continue to play out in tunnel building today.

The Brunel Museum are seeking people with experience of construction work to help us tell the story of the workers who built the Thames Tunnel in our new permanent exhibition launching in Summer 2025.

About The Brunel Museum

Based in Rotherhithe, The Brunel Museum is an educational charity that tells the story of one of the world's great engineering dynasties. Our mission is to preserve and share widely the ground-breaking stories of the Thames Tunnel project and the outstanding achievements of the Brunel family and their relevance to our lives today. We inspire communities through exploration, learning and performance.

The museum is currently in the middle of a £2.2 million redevelopment project, including a generous £1.85m grant from the National Lottery Heritage Fund (NLHF), that will transform the Brunel Museum's visitor experience through the creation of a brand-new welcome pavilion, new exhibition spaces and improvements to facilities, as well as an ambitious and engaging activity programme for residents, families and schools.

About the Project

The Brunel Museum are looking for people with experience of construction work to take part in a collaborative exhibition project exploring the lives and legacies to the workers who built the Thames Tunnel. While hundreds of workers in a variety of different roles were involved in the building of the Thames Tunnel, it is the stories of engineers, such as Marc Brunel, that have been documented and celebrated today. The Brunel Museum is committed to platforming previously neglected working-class histories and would like to collaborate with present-day construction workers to help us tell these stories.


The project will consist of **8**, **3-hour sessions from June- December** at dates and times to be agreed with participants. Sessions will be a **mix of online and in person**. In person sessions will take place at **The Brunel Museum in Rotherhithe** or at a location nearby.

Participants will be paid a participation fee at London Living Wage of £13.11 per hour + a £10 travel stipend for each in person session.

In these sessions, participants will collaborate with museum staff and volunteers to do the following:

- Use existing research to explore the stories of workers of the Thames Tunnel
- Explore connections and resonances between the experiences of Thames Tunnel workers and the experiences of construction workers today including the differences and similarities in working conditions.





• Decide on how best to present the Thames Tunnel workers stories in the exhibition, including choosing the right objects, stories, details and language to convey the reality of workers' lives.

We are particularly interested to hear from any construction workers who have experience working in the roles below that have equivalent roles in the Thames Tunnel project:

- Tunnellers
- Bricklayers
- Blacksmiths
- Riggers
- Millwrights
- Sawyers

If you have construction experience that is not on this list but are still interested in being part of our project, then please do still apply.
