Local girl hosts Underground Concert in memory of her Grandad – Parkinson's UK

Poppy Hulse, age 16, from Rotherhithe, has put together an exhibition and performance at the Brunel Museum to raise awareness of Parkinson's, in memory of her Grandfather, Henry Pluckrose, who died of the disease, age 79, on 6 April 2011.

Henry, a well known writer and teacher, was diagnosed with Parkinson's over 16 years ago. The event describes Henry's life with Parkinson's, but also remembers his love of music and his sense of fun. He was a former Southwark Cathedral chorister, and as well as a prolific writer, worked in the education department at the Royal Opera House.

In the London area alone there are approximately 15,000 people with Parkinson's, which is 1 in 500 of the population. Poppy worked with Parkinson's UK, the support and research charity working to find a cure, which put her in touch with local support groups that helped to form the research for the exhibition.

Poppy said:

"This event is a celebration of my grandad's life. I thought an exhibition and performance would not only be something special in his memory but also help to raise awareness of how devastating Parkinson's can be for sufferers and their families.

"Before I began the project I did not know that much about Parkinson's. Through speaking to other people living with this illness I have learnt so much more about the disease. I was very close to my Grandad and the project has helped me to understand what he went through. I hope that this will be a fitting tribute. He would have loved fire hula hoops..."

The event at the Brunel Museum Rotherhithe from Friday 23 to Sunday 25 March, is in three parts:

- A short presentation explaining about Parkinson's, its symptoms and affects.
- A collection of photographs, drawings and texts exploring Poppy's family's experience of Parkinson's
- A short performance, with singing, dancing and LED hula hooping in recognition of Henry's work with young people

Tickets (£8) for the event will be available on the door. All proceeds from the event are to be donated to Parkinson's UK.
